

Main Spots to Visit in Central Asia

Kyrgyzstan

Bishkek

The capital and largest city of Kyrgyzstan, Bishkek is a vibrant hub with a mix of Soviet-era architecture, modern buildings, and beautiful parks. Key attractions include Ala-Too Square, Osh Bazaar, and the State History Museum. Bishkek is a great starting point for exploring the rest of the country.

Issyk-Kul

Though technically a lake and not a city, Issyk-Kul is a major tourist destination. The towns along the lake, such as Balykchy, Cholpon-Ata, and Karakol, are popular for beach activities, trekking, and exploring historical sites. Issyk-Kul is one of the largest saline lakes in the world, surrounded by the stunning Tien Shan Mountains.

Karakol

Karakol is located at the eastern edge of Issyk-Kul Lake and is the gateway to Jeti-Ögüz and Altyn Arashan, both famous for their natural beauty. The city itself has a Russian influence, with historical sites like the Russian Orthodox Church and Dungan Mosque. Karakol is also a base for trekking in the nearby mountains.

Osh

As the second-largest city, Osh is considered the cultural and historical heart of Kyrgyzstan. Located near the Uzbek border, it has a rich history dating back to ancient times. Don't miss Sulaiman-Too, a mountain that's a UNESCO World Heritage site, and the bustling Osh Bazaar.

Tajikistan

Dushanbe

Turkmenistan

Ashgabat

Darvaza

Darvaza, or the Door to Hell, is a fiery gas crater in the Turkmenistan desert that has been burning since 1971. Its intense flames create a surreal and captivating sight, making it a popular and unique attraction for visitors.

Mary

Samarkand

Known as one of the most famous Silk Road cities, Samarkand is a UNESCO World Heritage site and a must-visit for history enthusiasts. Registan Square, Shah-i-Zinda, the Gur-e-Amir Mausoleum (Tamerlane's tomb), and the Bibi-Khanym Mosque are among the city's most iconic landmarks. Samarkand is often regarded as the jewel of Central Asia due to its architectural splendor.

Tashkent
