

Main Spots to Visit in Japan

Fukuoka

Located on the northern shore of Kyushu Island, Fukuoka is Japan's sixth-largest city and the largest city in the Kyushu region. Known for its rich history, vibrant food scene, and modern attractions, it offers highlights such as Ohori Park, Fukuoka Tower, and the historic Hakata district.
